### **CHAMBER SINGERS**

While Chamber Singers is open to all students who qualify (you do not have to be a music major), the choir is made up of highly advanced, aspiring professional singers. Most are graduate students in voice or opera. (The choir usually has a few junior and senior undergraduate music majors. We have occasionally had highly skilled graduate students from other majors, such as film or theatre.)

To join Chamber Singers, you must participate in the general auditions that take place on the first two days of classes in the fall. You will receive detailed information about this in early August.

The audition consists of singing a 2-minute art song or aria and sight-singing.

### **ASU CHORAL ENSEMBLES MISSION STATEMENT**

The ASU Choirs in the Herberger Institute of Design and the Arts School of Music promote members' growth as creative, dynamic musicians through polished performances of outstanding repertory in a positive, professional atmosphere. The ensembles provide members with outstanding opportunities to apply their knowledge of voice, music history and music theory to create a compelling musical experience for the listener and performer.

The Chamber Singers is ASU's premier choral ensemble. This highly selective group is made up primarily of graduate voice students. Members are chosen on the basis of a rigorous audition. The Chamber Singers (and their predecessor groups with other names) have appeared at national and regional conventions of the American Choral Directors Association and the National Collegiate Choral Organization. Past directors have included Doug McEwen and Don Bailey.

The choir performs music from each of the major style periods ranging from unaccompanied to instrumentally accompanied literature.

Chamber Singers seeks to help students expand their experience as performers and musical thinkers. Students hone their skills, practice their technique, and perform at the highest possible level both in rehearsal and in concert for the benefit of the audience, their fellow members, and themselves.

Because the members are advanced musicians, the rehearsal process will be different at times from other groups: not all the decisions will come from the podium. We seek to the extent possible to make this a collaborative enterprise among mature musicians. We seek to involve all members in the musical process for greater understanding and commitment. Above all, we seek to have a good time making outstanding music together!

### **SCHEDULE**

For fall 2018, there will be 2 concerts. All members will sing on the October 16 concert. For the Bernstein MASS on November 17 and 18, those not cast for roles in the Street Chorus will sing with the large chorus.

#### Attendance:

Each member is crucial to this ensemble at every rehearsal for which you are called. When you miss a rehearsal, you affect all the other members of the group. Therefore, the attendance policy is simple: Be Here! ① You should attend all rehearsals except in the case of a legitimate emergency or serious illness. Please be on time to all rehearsals (in the room ready to sing at the appointed start time), and come prepared with your music and a pencil.

You are excused (but still notify me) if you must miss because of a religious observance or a university-sanctioned activity.

**IF YOU MUST MISS A REHEARSAL:** please email me. For conflicts you know about in advance, **please** speak to me as soon as possible.

If illness prevents you from singing **but you are not contagious** and otherwise out and about, please come to rehearsal and listen.

Missing announced rehearsals without approval will affect your grade. Missing a dress rehearsal or concert without approval will result in a failing grade for the semester.

You may miss up to three rehearsals (except mandatory rehearsals) without any effect upon your grade. After that, each absence lowers your grade.
