Course Description

Introduces quantitative techniques as applied to problems in sustainability. Includes challenges like quantifying the impact of human activities on the environment, population dynamics, the spread of infectious diseases and the impact of resource extraction on ecological systems.

Learning Outcomes

As a result of taking this class, you should be able to

• Create graphs in Excel of data.

- Calculate mean, medium, modus and variance of data sets.
- Calculate the human impact using the IPAT equation.
- Interpret and calculate probabilities and conditional probability.
- Understand and apply exponential and logistic growth models.
- Implement those growth models in Excel.
- Understand and calculate in Excel predator-prey dynamics and infectious disease models.

Students will participate in this course through Canvas. Course content will be delivered through video-lectures, discussion boards, supplemental videos and assessments. A textbook is required for this course (see below). Assignment

How to write a proper email

Submitting Assignments

About the pace and flow of this compressed class session:

For three weeks of our class (Weeks 2, 3, and 7) the material will be more condensed with two modules per each of those weeks. The other four weeks (Week 1, 4, 5 and 6) will have one module per week. Assignments and quizzes will usually be due on Weds/Sunday, depending on the module and week.
