#### COURSE DESCRIPTION (GENERAL STUDIES AND COURSE GOALS)

This class introduces students to the academic study of religion and surveys the global range of human spiritual and religious experience. It examines various worldwide patterns of religious beliefs and practices and then investigates particular faiths, communities, and traditions. Through lectures and videos, the course strives to understand and interpret what religion means in the modern world as well as what religion has meant in different times and places in human history.



#### **COURSE OVERVIEW**

This course is divided into 11 modules:

- 1) a brief introduction to the Study of Religion (1 module);
- 2) an introduction to religions originating in India (= 4 modules: Hinduism, Buddhism, Jainism, and Sikhism);
- 3) an introduction to religions originating in East Asia (= 2 units: Daoism and Confucianism),
- 4) an overview of the Abrahamic traditions of Judaism, Christianity, and Islam which originated in the Middle East. (= 3 units with an introduction to Zoroastrianism)

Classes will involve (1) reading textbook chapters (Molloy), lectures (posted on the course site) and primary documents (Workbook), (2) viewing films, YouTube clips, and videotaped power point presentations, and (3) exploring one current event tied to religion (as extra-credit).

The steps are the same for every unit: first read Molloy, second watch films in video section and my video lectures, third read lecture posted on site, fourth quiz yourself for unit exam preparation, and fifth, take the timed main exam. In general, quizzes should be completed a day before the main exam.

#### **REQUIREMENTS**

I hope that you will enjoy this class as much as I do. Please look at the requirements carefully before entering it. They include

- Molloy Chapter Quizzes for every unit (10 to 20 questions): these quizzes are based on Molloy's chapters. They are not timed.
- Video Quizzes (always 5 points each): these five-question quizzes are based on films posted in the video section of the course (not on the films posted within the course lectures). They are not timed.
- Lecture Quizzes (10 to 20 questions per quiz): these quizzes are based on my lectures posted on the course site.
- Reading Quizzes in Workbook (10 to 20 questions per quiz): these quizzes are based on primary texts in Workbook. They are not timed.
- **Timed Exam Quizzes for every unit** (15 to 100 questions maximum) at the end of each unit. The first one is the longest. All study guides are posted on Canvas. Please read them carefully and pay attention to the content of my lecture notes and video lectures.

Besides these graded exercises, you will be encouraged to answer video questions and complete crosswords in the Workbook. This homework will not be collected but you are strongly encouraged to do these exercises if you wish to shine on the day of your major unit exams

(without looking at your notes).

Please note that once you begin quizzes, you cannot leave the computer. You have to complete and submit the quizzes. Otherwise you might be locked out and lose the points.

DO NOT TAKE quizzes or exams on your smartphone.

Never begin a quiz until you are prepared to take it. In general, all quizzes are open on the first day of the unit and closed the day before your main unit exam (11:59 PM, Arizona time).

Please avoid taking them all on the day they are officially due. If you do, you will not score well.

Please, make sure that you have completed your readings or watched the videos before taking any quiz.

Please note that you have a quiz on every chapter of Molloy and a quiz on every lecture

posted on the Website. You might not have a video quiz on every film posted on your course site. The number of reading quizzes on primary documents found in the Workbook varies from one unit to the other (in general one to four maximum). Every time I assign you a text to read in the Workbook, expect a quiz.

You also have non-graded homework to help you review for exams (crossword puzzles, answering video questions in Workbook by hand, matching games, etc.) These exercises are not mandatory but highly recommended. They will help you remember the main concepts and vocabulary for every tradition.
