#### FRE 202: Intermediate French II

## Course and Faculty Information

#### **Course Description:**

This is the second half of the Intermediate French sequence. Emphasis will be on both oral and written communication through development of skills in listening, speaking, reading, writing, and cultural awareness.

<u>Themes and topics:</u> health-related topics (describing one's body, health, illnesses, remedies, medical visits and treatments) daily routines, Internet and social media, technology and electronic products, cars and driving, the city, businesses and small shops, post office.

<u>Cultural topics:</u> healthcare in France, technology in France and the Ariane rocket, driving in France, car manufacturing in France, cultural and historical information about Belgium, cultural and historical information about Quebec, and French cities and towns.

<u>Grammar topics:</u> reflexive verbs in present and past tenses, the pronouns "y" and "en" reciprocal reflexives, the conditional, the verbs "ouvrir," "croire," "recevoir," "apercevoir," and "offrir", the use of prepositions with the infinitive, the simple future, negative and affirmative expressions

- 1. Use the target language to accomplish basic communicative tasks.
- 2. Create a narrative describing people, things, and events in the present, future, past, and conditional tenses.
- 3. Express approval and disapproval using a variety of expressions.
- 4. Ask for suggestions and information, and offer personal opinions, preferences, and emotions.
- 5. Use expressions to invite, accept and refuse invitations, and grant and refuse permissions.

- 6. Demonstrate comprehension of spoken and recorded French in every day conversations, situations and stories.
- 7. Read and comprehend the main idea and most of the supporting details of both edited and non-edited material (including short narratives, fairy tales, songs, and plays, advertisements, tourist brochures, and newspaper articles on familiar topics, magazine interviews)
- 8. Meet a number of practical writing needs, such as short one-page essays, simple letters, emails or messages in which content involves personal experiences, and opinion pieces on familiar topics, and respond in writing to the ideas and opinions of others.
- 9. Demonstrate comprehension of the main idea and supporting details in edited and non-edited materials.
- 10. Write formal and informal pieces on familiar topics and respond to the ideas and opinion of others.

**Chapter Exams:** At the end of each chapter, you will take an exam, which will include listening, reading, and writing sections.

**Final Oral Exam:** At the end of the course, your speaking and listening skills will be assessed during an individual oral interview with the instructor. It will cover topics discussed throughout the semester. A grading rubric and a study guide will be posted on Canvas.

**Homework (VHL):** Your homework will consist of watching presentations on the vocabulary and grammar topics covered in each unit. You will also complete listening, speaking, reading, writing, cultural, and video activities collected on the book's accompanying supersite.

**Writing assignments:** You will have 5 total writing assignments based on the material covered in the various units. These assignments will be posted and submitted via Canvas with clear due dates. You will be required to use Bon Patron, a free, online French spelling and grammar check, to go over your draft before you turn it in. More information and detail will be listed on the assignments.

**Participation:** The participation grade is based on weekly speaking appointments with your instructor and interactive group activities, as well as discussion boards. The

speaking appointment with the instructor will consist of pronunciation and conversation activities which you will prepare in advance.

**Quizzes:** Short, self-graded quizzes (on Canvas) will be given on specific topics to help you improve your accuracy. There will be 2 quizzes per unit.
