Course Description

Welcome to Spanish 101: Elementary Spanish 1. This course will give you a basic foundation of the Spanish language skills and knowledge of the cultures of Spanish-speaking world. This course is designed to help you develop your Spanish language proficiency in speaking, writing, reading, and listening and your intercultural communicative competence as it relates to Spanish-speaking cultures

Credits: 4

Note: This is an **accelerated** 6-week course for students capable of working in a fast-paced environment. The time requirement for this course is 180 hours (about 20-24 hours per week). If you have concerns or would like a slower pace, we offer a 15-week version of this course in Fall and Spring. Prerequisites: Spanish Placement Test score of 0-249; Students may not enroll in SPA 101 if credit with C or better earned in SPA 102 or 110 or 111 or 201 or 202 or 203 or 204 or 210 or 313 or 314 or 315 or 316 or 325 or 412

Course Learning Outcomes

ACTFL Guidelines

Students who successfully complete SPA 101 will be able to communicate at the novice-mid level according to the <u>ACTFL Guidelines</u>. This means that students will be able to:

- 1. **Communicate** short messages on predictable, everyday topics.
- 2. Use learned words and phrases to carry out simple conversations.
- 3. Successfully **participate** in simple conversations with native speakers and **be aware** of cultural differences.
- 4. **Explain** and draw comparisons of some cultural differences between their own culture and Hispanic cultures.

Modes of Communication

The content of this class has been designed to develop your ability to communicate in three different modes

- **Interpersonal Communication**: Learners interact and negotiate meaning in spoken, signed, or written conversations to share information, reactions, feelings, and opinions.
- **Interpretive Communication:** Learners understand, interpret, and analyze what is heard, read, or viewed on a variety of topics.
- **Presentational Communication:** Learners present information, concepts, and ideas to inform, explain, persuade, and narrate on a variety of topics using appropriate media and adapting to various audiences of listeners, readers, or viewers.
- **Intercultural Communication**: Learners have the ability to interact with people from another country and culture in a foreign language.

Assignment Description

Course Readiness/Webcape - Cerego (5%)

Estimated time required: 1-2 hours at the beginning of the course

Description: This category helps you prepare for your course including a syllabus quiz, student introduction and entry WebCape

These activities are designed to prepare you for the course and give you a brief introduction to course content and structure. You will complete all activities in Module 0 to complete this step. One activity, the entry WebCape, is designed to set a standard for where your Spanish abilities are coming into the course. The most important thing is to take this quiz to the best of your ability. There will be some answers you do not know, but honest completion to the best of your ability is the key to success.

Vocabulary - Cerego (5%)

Estimated time required: 1 hour per week (10 minutes a day)

Description: Cerego is a memory-management tool that will help you learn vocabulary items more quickly and remember them longer, thanks to scheduled reviews personalized to your own progress.

Each module you will work with the vocabulary of the associated chapter. In the review modules, you will work with the vocabulary covered until that point in the semester. You will receive credit for your performance in each set when you reach a 1.5 level. For a good

performance, you should study **10-15 minutes per day**. You will receive emails from Cerego reminding you to interact with the material and refresh your memories. We recommend that you use the **mobile app**. Download the Cerego app on the App Store or on Google Play. This type of application will allow you to use it on your way to work, while waiting in line for coffee or whenever you have a few free minutes.

Online Coursework - VHL (15%)

Estimated time required: 8 hours per week

Description: Vista Higher Learning (VHL) is the online platform of the course. It contains interactive grammar presentations, interactive video tutorials, and practice activities. It is **crucial** that you spend the allotted time studying and practicing the different concepts as these activities will help you with other course assessments. You will have three due dates per week, but will receive one grade per module.

To help you process what you learn and establish good study habits, activities are due on VHL three days a week. Since due dates are set from the beginning of the semester, you can always **work ahead**, but we recommend you that you spend at least 8-12 hours a week with the material.

The grade assigned to each online assignment will be based on performance. Therefore, **BEFORE** doing your computer-graded activities, you **are expected to study the vocabulary and the grammar explanations** in VHL. Explanations are in English and are clear and concise. If after studying the explanations you still have doubts, discuss them with your instructor during their office hours.

For each activity, you will receive a grade based on the accuracy of your performance. For most activities, you will be allowed unlimited attempts. For true/false or open-ended activities, you will have only one attempt. Note that spelling and accent marks will signal a difference in your performance, as will proper vocabulary and sentence structure.

Online activities are due at 11:59pm Arizona time. After that time, homework will **NOT** be accepted.

Virtual Sessions (Linguameeting and Instructor Meetings) (15%)

Expected time required: 1 hour per week (30 min of preparation, 30 min of speaking)

1. A meeting with your classmates and a native speaker.

This assignment will take place via Linguameeting. These sessions are designed for you to practice the grammar concepts and vocabulary of the module and your oral communication skills with your classmates and a trained native speaker. You will be expected to prepare for the module before the session through material review of grammar and vocabulary.

2. A virtual meeting with your classmates and your instructor.

This assignment will take place via Zoom, ASU's video conferencing software. These sessions are designed for you to practice grammar concepts and vocabulary of the module and your oral communication skills with your classmates with the guidance of your instructor. You will be expected to prepare for the module before the session through material review of grammar and vocabulary

Oral Communication (Video Forum and Role Plays) (20%)

Expected time required: 1 hour per week (30 min of preparation, 30 min of speaking)

1. A video forum.

This assignment is divided into two parts. First, you will leave a short video message for your classmates. Afterwards, you will return and record another video as a response to one or more of the classmates in your group. To complete this activity, you will have to use the vocabulary and grammar structures covered in the module and go a bit beyond. So, you will be expected to review them and look for information before recording your video.

2. A self-recorded role-play session with other classmates.

This assignment will take place via Zoom, ASU's video conferencing software. You will complete this assignment two times during the semester during Review Modules. This activity will be a good opportunity to practice the format and the content of the Final Oral Exam. During the activity you will complete a role-play activity with one-two other classmate(s). To complete this activity, you will have to use the vocabulary and the grammar structures covered in the review session module. So, you will be expected to review them before meeting with your classmates.

Written Communication (10%)

Expected time required: 2 hours per module (1 hour of preparation, 1 hour of writing)

Description: At the end of each content module you will submit a writing assignment that will demonstrate your ability to communicate through text using the vocabulary and grammar structures presented in the module. The text will give you an opportunity to put the grammar structures and vocabulary of the module to use.

Pruebas (10%)

Time requirement: ~3 hours per review module (2 hours of preparation, 50 minutes of testing)

Description: Two times during the semester, we will review information that we have seen to help with retention of the information. The prueba or quiz will take place at the end of the review modules and last 50 minutes involving combined skills such as vocabulary, grammar, listening, reading and writing to evaluate your current and cumulative knowledge of the material and your current level with regard to ACTFL standards. The prueba will be proctured using

Respondus Lockdown Browser + Webcam. We recommend that you follow the instructions closely before beginning the prueba. During these pruebas you will **not** have access to your notes or the module. What is most important here is to show what you **can** do!

Final Oral and Written Exams (20%)

Expected time required: 5.5 hours (4 hour of preparation, 1 hour 30 minutes of testing)

Description of Final Oral Exam: At the conclusion of the course, you will have a final oral exam to see how well you meet the overall guidelines of the course. This speaking assessment will mirror the self-recorded role plays completed in Review Modules 1-2. You will have 10 minutes to prepare for the exam with a prompt and then 5 minutes to speak with your classmates.

Description of Final Written Exam: At the conclusion of the course, you will have a final written exam to assess how well you meet the overall guidelines of the course. This final written exam will be used to see how you have grown during the course.
