Course Description

CHI 205 is intended to provide student fundamental knowledge on Chinese calligraphy through discussions on the history of Chinese calligraphy in addition to actually practicing writing with traditional calligraphy tools. The class will trace the development of Chinese calligraphy from the Shang dynasty to contemporary times, including the writing tools, the different types of script, and important calligraphers. The student will look at calligraphy works from different periods written in seal script, clerical script, regular script and semicursive script by major calligraphy masters. Meanwhile, the student will have the opportunity to learn how to write Chinese and practice themselves in class under the instructor's guidance. The course will involve reading, discussion, critique, and calligraphy practice.

A. Subject (chose one)

You need to create your own Chinese calligraphy work by yourself. You may copy a work directly from your selected work or interpret it in your own understanding and create your final project. Please choose one topic as below,

• Option I:

Please create your own Chinese calligraphy work. You can choose any kinds of writing styles (seal script, regular script, etc.) The content can be a poem, prose (partage, if too long) or so on.

• Option II:

Please create your own Chinese calligraphy work as a gift. The type of work that you create can be the card, postcard, bookmark and so on. I will return your work before end of the semester. You are able to give your calligraphy work as the gift to

your family members or your friends (or people who you love and care).

B. Short Essay

Paper

Due to the remote course, you would not have the presentation and peer-review. Instead, please finish a short essay (no limits to the number of pages), prepare an analysis for your calligraphy work as below (for your reference),

- 1. Description of your creation
- 1. Why you want to create this work? Does it have any special meaning?
- 2. In your work, which part is your favorite?
- 3. Do you have any special experiences/ challenges/ obstacles when you create your work?
- 4. Others

Hint:

1)The paper must be double-spaced, 12 point font, Times New Roman; US letter size. Page numbers and Notes (if you have) must be placed at the bottom of the page.

2) All the writing must observe the academic convention, and citations of primary and secondary sources must follow the standard MLA format.

Search the Chinese character (one character each time), select the script you like to view and check "搜索", you are able to see other ancient calligraphers' writings. Below the checking block, you can select different scripts (seal, seal carving, bamboo slips, clerical, steles of Wei, running, cursive, and regular scripts.
