COURSE OBJECTIVES: The purpose of this course is to give a broad overview of marriage, intimate relationships and the courtship process. We will be exploring courtship and marriage through different sociological perspectives such as exchange theory, interactionism, functionalism, family development and family systems theory, and if these theories are applicable to understanding marriage. We will also be examining gender, roles, commitment, need, children, and communication among other areas in order to further understand marriage and intimate relationships. Why do we choose to pair with another person? What are the cycles of marriage? In society today, what constitutes a marriage? Are having children the definition of being a family?

<u>COURSE REQUIREMENTS</u>: <u>Do not take this course if you are looking for a blow-off class that is easy</u>. Because this class is an Internet based course in six weeks and is largely self-guided through readings and online material, this class can be difficult. You should plan on <u>devoting at least three hours a day on the readings</u>.

### **Weekly Quizzes:**

THERE ARE 6 WEEKLY "QUIZZES" FOR THIS COURSE! Each "quiz" will have 30 multiple choice questions.

The quizzes are timed, and you will have 45 minutes in which to complete the quiz. The quizzes will come from both the textbook, and the PowerPoint lecture material. The quizzes ARE open book, but please do not take this lightly. Hint: To do as well as possible on the quizzes, you should familiarize yourself with the material enough that you could take the quizzes without the aid of an "open book." Remember, this is YOUR grade, therefore your responsibility.

Because people's schedules are varied during the summer, the quizzes are available for 48 hours! You may take the quiz any time during that time frame. Remember, quizzes are TIMED! 45 minutes! Once you start...you MUST finish the quiz! There is NO starting and finishing later. Once the timer starts...IT DOES NOT STOP!!!

On MONDAY @ 12:00am of each week, the quizzes will "open" in that week's "Module" for you to start the quiz anytime that is within your schedule the next 48 hours.

### **Discussion Forums**:

There is a discussion forum associated with each topic we cover. You must post in the forums at least FIVE (5) times per week with each post being worth two points.

That would give you 10 possible points each week. There are 60 possible points from posting in the forums IF you post a total of 30 times in the session (5 times each week times 6 weeks = 30 posts).

# The posts are counted from 12:00am on WEDNESDAY until 11:59pm on the following TUESDAY @ 11:59pm of each week that they are due.

<u>It does not matter which topic you post in.</u> You may post your comment, question, answer to someone else's question in any of the Discussion forums currently visible for that week.

You MAY post all your comments in each of the forums that week, or all in the same forum.

You will be graded on the number and the **substantial QUALITY** of your posts in the forums. To receive all the points possible, <u>your posts MUST be substantial</u>. In other words, posts such as, "oh yeah", "did you get that?" or "did anyone know what Fey meant…", and/or "Party tonight at my house" are NOT considered substantial posts.

<u>Posts CAN BE</u>: Post MORE than one or two sentences!! A solid question <u>regarding the material</u>, **OR** a FULL answer to another person's question, **OR** a well-thought out comment on a topic are all examples of a substantial post. Of course you can post as often as you would like, <u>and you will</u> not be penalized for "over-posting."

**DO NOT wait until the last day to do all of your discussion board participation**!!! The object of the Forums are for each of you to contribute throughout the week to help each other and discuss the topics. If you only post on the last couple of days...you will be warned ONCE! After that, there will be a deduction of points for lack of PARTICIPATION!! "Participation" means interaction, contributing, discussing....not just doing the minimum requirements. Think about it this way...if you wait to post in the discussion boards until the last day they are due...who will get the chance to read them? How are you helping others (or yourself) prepare for the

quizzes...when everyone is taking the quiz that day!! Post throughout the week and read each other's posts!!!

<u>Late or Missing Work:</u> You must provide valid proof of the reason for missing work. This can be a Doctor's note, hospital records, a University sanctioned event, etc. Discussions can only be made up if you were physically unable to participate for the ENTIRE week. "Forgetting" to do an assignment is NOT a valid excuse!
