Course Description:

Welcome to Italian 101: Elementary Italian I. This course will help you reach the novice range level according to <u>ACTFL</u>. This course will give you a basic foundation of Italian language skills and knowledge of Italian culture. This course is designed to help you develop your Italian language proficiency in speaking, writing, reading, and listening and your intercultural communicative competence as it relates to Italian culture.

Credits: 4

Prerequisites: None

Note: This is an **accelerated 7.5-week course** for students capable of working in a fast-paced environment. The time required for this course is 180 hours (about 20-24 hours per week).

Course Learning Outcomes

After this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Effectively listen to simple native speech and respond appropriately
- 2. Read simple texts in the target language on topics studied in class
- 3. Compose simple but coherent written passages
- 4. Communicate orally in simple but complete sentences with good pronunciation

A parallel goal of the course is to introduce students to Italian society by incorporating a cultural component in all aspects of classroom and online instruction in the form of cultural readings, videos, and more.

The coursework for ITA 101 online will cover 3 units of the textbook SENTIERI (Unità 1, Unità 2, and Unità 3).

Each unit is presented in two lessons: *Lezione A* and *Lezione B*. Each lesson will be spread as per course schedule; the deadlines for the assignments will always at 11:59 pm Mountain Time -- Arizona time

Assignments in this course

Daily homework in Sentieri (VHL Supersite)

Sentieri is the title of your textbook. It means "paths", as in paths through the Italian language and culture. In order to prepare for each class, you will have **daily online assignments**, which will be completed, on the VHL *Sentieri Supersite* (the textbook companion website). **In order to complete the assignments, you will have to read and study the corresponding material in the textbook.** The deadline for all assignments is 11:59 pm MST. There is a 25% penalty for late



submissions. **No late assignments will be accepted after a unit is completed and grades are posted**. All assignments are graded; you have **four attempts** to complete most of them. You will need a working microphone for your assignments, or you can use the Language Lab (for students close to the Tempe campus). *Sentieri Supersite* offers robust help and technical support services, use them to learn how to navigate the site or if you run into any technical difficulties. You are to resolve your technical issues.

Lesson Quizzes (VHL Supersite)

There will be a short lesson quiz at the end of each lesson (A/B), six in total **in VHL Supersite**. The quizzes are timed at 20 minutes and will shut down automatically when the time has expired. They are meant to be a quick check of your vocabulary and grammar acquisition. Prepare ahead of time, you will not have time to search for information once you have started the quiz. Next-day late submissions will receive 10% penalty per day after the deadline.

Written discussions (in Canvas)

Discussions posted on Canvas will foster exchange with your classmates and a sense of community. **Students are required to participate in two steps in two different days per Discussion Board:** in the first step -- **initial post** -- will answer the questions in the main thread, and in the second step -- **response posts** -- will comment on your classmates' posts. The content of the discussion is linked to the theme of the unit studied. Please use common sense: just saying that you agree or disagree or asking repetitive questions does not constitute an acceptable post. The grade you will receive is based on the quality and the amount of your participation as judged by the professor and as described in the discussion board rubric. The posts must address the topic and add something new and substantive to the discussion. **Discussion boards will also assess students' writing skill.** All responses must be your own. **Late submission will receive 10%** penalty for next day submission and 25% for later submission. After grades for the until are posted, no late work is accepted. Please, review **ASU academic integrity policy** on the use of online translators such as *google translate*.

Partner chats (in Canvas via Zoom)

Partner chats are synchronous brief conversations between two students. Students are required to record and submit one partner chat per module. Students will have a topic to use for their questions and a rubric to know the criteria used to grade the chat.

Students will find a <u>spreadsheet for scheduling</u>. Students can complete them any time before their deadline.

LinguaMeeting Sessions (links in Canvas)

As part of the course requirement, students are expected to attend 3 online 30 minutes conversations in small-groups with a trained native speaker using LinguaMeeting. The purpose of these sessions is to provide a safe environment for you to practice conversation in the course's target language. LinguaMeeting offers flexibility for you to schedule each session with the



language coach and time of preference. During each session, you are expected to take an active role by engaging in conversation and asking questions. Sessions are evaluated by the language coach in accordance to your participation, punctuality, and class preparedness.

You will be expected to prepare before the session through a material review of grammar and vocabulary to enable you to express yourself in Italian according to the session's topic listings.

Conversations with the instructor (in Canvas via Zoom)

During the semester you will meet with your instructor and a small group of other students for oral practice. During these meetings, you will practice what you have learned and work with your classmates. While prompting and guiding students, the instructor will assess their speaking proficiency and provide feedback. Students will find a spreadsheet for scheduling. The actual conversation will be held in Zoom with a microphone and webcam on. The approximate length of each conversation will be about 20-30 minutes. The topic of the conversation will be relative to the current coursework. You will earn points for being able to participate in the activities with your classmates, respond to the prompts and demonstrate that you are on track with the course material. A grading rubric is posted on Canvas. The conversations may be recorded for purposes of record-keeping and/or grading.

Final Project (in Canvas)

You will create a video presentation in Italian on one of the themes covered in this course. This is an opportunity for you to showcase what you have learned in this course, have fun and be creative. You will record your video using the record/upload media tool in the discussion board located in **Canvas, module 3, Video finale.**

Self Assessment

At the end of each unit, students can complete a brief self--assessment worksheet. The self-assessment is meant for you to reflect on your work and the feedback that is sent to you throughout the semester. The goals of the self--assessment are:

- To reflect on your own learning process.
- Discuss if or how you are achieving the communicative goals for each unit.
- To realize how much you have learned
- To pinpoint challenging aspecta and find strategies to overcome to improve the learning process

Feedback for assignments

Grades reflect your performance on assignments, activities and exams and adherence to deadlines. Assignments will be assigned on both **Canvas and Sentieri Supersite.**



In online courses, **it is essential that you access detailed feedback** on your assignments posted by the instructor. You will have feedback from the instructor on your Discussion Boards and Partner chats, Conversazioni in Grades, while the feedback for *Sentieri* Supersite assignments can be found on that website by clicking on the assignment.

All assignments, unless otherwise announced, MUST be submitted to the designated area of Canvas. **Do not submit an assignment via email.**
