Course and Faculty Information

Course Description: This course will explore concepts in inorganic chemistry from a molecular and a solid-state point of view. Special focus items will be the description of the geometry and structure of molecules and solids, different bonding types and situations, organometallic chemistry, the synthesis and reaction of the compounds of interest. In addition, the students will get familiar with trends in the periodic table of the elements and characteristics of the elements and different subgroups within the periodic table. This will allow them to understand the typical behavior of the elements as well as the existence and formation of compounds/materials.

Course Learning Objectives

You will build on knowledge from all of your previous chemistry courses to develop an understanding of bonding, electronic structure, properties, and reactivity of molecular and solid inorganic compounds. Upon completion of this course you will have the foundational inorganic knowledge needed for further study in such fields as solid state chemistry, materials chemistry, coordination and organometallic chemistry, chemical catalysis, and bioinorganic chemistry.
