Course Syllabus

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BIO 394 Medicine:

Getting in, Being in, and Going Beyond!

Course and Faculty Information

Course Description:

This 2-credit hour course is designed as an introduction to the various subspecialties in modern medical practice. In each class, a subspecialty expert will give an overview of their specialty, describe the types of medical disorders treated in the subspecialty, describe technologies used in the specialty, explain how the specialty interfaces and depends upon other specialties, and describe the education, training and certification required to practice the specialty. Speakers will give personal viewpoints about the specialty including why they entered the specialty, what they like most (and least) about the specialty, how they think the specialty is changing, and what opportunities for the future exist in the specialty. Students will have the opportunity to pose questions to speakers in class, and students will participate in weekly reflections and class discussions to better understand themselves, and exchange commentary and questions with one another. Each week, every student will be required to turn in a written assignment called a "reflection" that summarizes how the specialties presented that week might align with or diverge from the student's personality and abilities.

- 8. Discuss the factors that affected the personal choices of experts in selecting the specialty.
- Assess how individual specialties in medicine align with their own innate personality and abilities.

Clifton Strengths and True Colors Quiz

In this course, you will begin Module 1 by getting to know your strengths better!

Personality profiling is a fun way to categorize your perceived strengths and preferences, which can help you determine the best career path that matches your results.

Specialties Reflection "Quizzes"

In modules 3-6 you will take a weekly "quiz" that asks you to reflect on the two specialty lectures that you have chosen to view from that week. Four specialty lectures will be offered each week. It is required that you watch at minimum 2 of the specialty lectures a week and use these videos to complete the Specialties Quiz for that corresponding week. If you'd like, you can watch all lectures for that week and reflect on all the specialties in the Reflection Quiz for that Module.

Yellowdig Conversations

Every week you will be required to connect with your classmates about what you're learning in each module in a tool called Yellowdig. You must participate every week by Friday at 11:59 pm AZ time.
