Course overview:

Women & Gender in Contemporary Society is a survey course which examines gendered experiences of sexuality, body image, popular culture, violence, work, and family within the United States. The goal of the course is to critically evaluate and understand the ways in which gender interacts with race, class, sexual orientation, ability, age, and other identity categories to shape both individual and collective experiences. Guided by seminal feminist writings, the course also challenges students to intellectually grapple with structural inequalities and to consider how they are personally situated within systems of power.

Course learning outcomes

At the completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Define key terms and concepts and apply them appropriately in context with one another, course material and personal reflections.
- Read course material critically and be able to apply key concepts, terms, and ideas from the lecture to the readings.
- Write analytically, summarizing key themes and theses from the readings, lectures, discussions and course content while critically engaging with and applying personal reflections, opinions, and experiences.
- Recognize, describe, and critique the overarching values embedded in patriarchal, hierarchical, and oppressive social systems.
- Utilize active learning as well as rhetorical listening while writing and speaking.

Course expectations:

Academic Work

This is an "online" (asynchronous) course, meaning that 100% of the class content is delivered online via Canvas learning management system. There is no specified location, day or time in which the class meets collectively. Additionally, this course is condensed and accelerated in # of weeks, however, not in content. In other words, nearly 15 weeks of material is covered in six (6). To be successful in this course you must engage with course content, consistently participate online, review academic readings, watch supplemental lectures and videos, and complete weekly assignments.

As part of each weekly unit, students will complete a homework assignment (which is submitted online via Canvas). Homework assignments are due by the same time every week: Saturday at 11:55 PM Arizona time. New "modules"

will open in Canvas each week and these modules contain the additional required work materials and assignment instructions. Please do not ask for modules to open early as the need to adjust material may be necessary.

Course Policies

All assignments must be submitted on time; **no late work will be accepted**. If a medical emergency arises and you are unable to complete your assignment, **please contact me as soon as possible** to discuss your make-up options. Per ASU policy, emergencies require appropriate documentation (i.e. a "doctor's note").

Please note: Technical issues do not constitute valid emergencies. Students are expected to be working far enough ahead of the homework deadline so that they can accommodate the minor technical mishaps which are characteristic of an online environment. *If you are experiencing a technical issue which will prevent you from submitting your work via Canvas, you must do TWO things in order to not be penalized:* first, you must email me a copy of the completed assignment (either as a MS Word document, or copy and paste the text of your work into the body of your email), and second, you must contact the ASU Help Desk (480-965- 6500), open a tech-issue "ticket", and then send me a copy of the ticket#.
