Assignment Details

Collaborative Annotation (i.e. Perusall) Discussions

In this class we will be using a textbook platform called Perusall. Perusall is an interactive textbook platform which will allow all of you to read, highlight, annotate, and have conversations with each other directly in the text. More details about Perusall and the assignments can be found on Canvas.

Reading Quizzes

Reading quizzes will cover the reading material for each chapter. Quizzes are not timed. You may use your book and notes. Each quiz may be attempted up to three times, and only the highest grade will count, although you will receive new questions with each new attempt.

Team Assignments

An important aspect of this class is working together in teams as part of a larger organization. We are reading and discussing interesting aspects of social processes, which is important, but to fully engage in this subject we need to actively participate in team exercises. The capacity to work in a team environment is critical in today's world as we collaborate to help solve very complex problems and challenges. Teamwork also helps us develop critical-thinking skills, negotiating skills, communication skills, interpersonal skills, and intercultural skills, to just name a few. Teamwork mirrors the real world where sharing information and understanding the views of others is often critical. Team projects are integral to this course and therefore an individual assignment in lieu of participating on a team project will not be an option. Lack of participation on a team project will result in a zero.

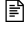
