Course Overview

Welcome! If you love Positive Psychology, you are in the right place. This is a fun class where we will explore some interesting and new ways that positive psychology can be applied in our lives and in our world. I'm looking forward to sharing it with you. I hope you will not only find this course interesting, but useful in your own life.

The format involves 5 **weekly discussion** assignments, **a journal assignment** submitted in week five, and 5 **weekly open book quizzes**. The course is asynchronous (no set time for lectures or participation) but I am available to you via email for any questions along the way. You have all week to complete your assignments for each module.

We have a "life happens" late policy in this class, which is described below. We strive to always maintain an **inclusive environment** for everyone, and I hope you will let me know if there is anything I can do to make the class better for you.

We have numerous helpful course assistants (CAs) who are available to help if you have questions or need additional support. You may also reach out to me (your instructor) ANYTIME if you have questions or concerns, and I encourage you to do so.

This course will explore the circumstances under which humans tend to flourish and report the highest levels of well being. General areas include: (1) leisure, flow and optimized experience,


(2) optimal wellbeing and positive health, (3) aesthetics and creativity, and (4) spirituality/or other sense of meaning in life.

Course Time Commitment and Student Success

Note that this course typically requires 135 hours of work. This equates to about 18 hours per module, preparing for and actively participating in this course. Oftentimes, when students struggle in class, it is because they are not devoting sufficient time to reading and studying, or the time spent is not utilized effectively.

Grading Procedure

Grades reflect your performance on assignments and adherence to deadlines. Quiz scores will be available immediately. Final course grades are determined based on **total points earned out of points possible.**

Applied Assignment

There is one brief journal assignment due in week 5. Instructions are in the modules section.

Quizzes

Quizzes cover the corresponding week's textbook reading material. Quizzes are worth 14 points each and contain multiple-choice/true-false questions. YOU MAY USE the textbook and your notes but you must complete the quizzes independently.

Yellowdig Participation

Due each week (weeks 2-6 on Saturday, midnight MST - Arizona time.) All class discussion will take place using a platform called Yellowdig, which is embedded in the Canvas course site. The format of this forum is different from a conventional discussion board and it instead reflects

the type of discussion that would occur in a traditional classroom environment. Similar to other social media platforms, posts are sorted by date and relevance.

There will be weekly prompts available on Monday of the corresponding week, and you are asked to address these prompts in each module. Be sure to read the tips included with the prompt. For example, it's important to support your points (with examples, logic, even your own research if you like.) Referring to course material is important to do. Use critical thought. After you have responded to the specific prompt in at least one POST, you are asked to provide 2 substantial comments to your peers.

Points are awarded for posting new posts and replying to (commenting on) others' posts. Creating a new POST with a minimum of 300 words earns 4 points; Adding a new COMMENT with a minimum of 50 words earns 1 point; 100% participation is achieved after earning 30 points throughout the course. Formal citations and references are not *required* on our Yellowdig Platform, but please include citations for any outside materials you discuss and be clear about the source of any assigned course materials (e.g., "In Chapter 2, the authors discuss the idea that..." or "In the Module 3 lecture presentation, Dr. Tromp mentions the phenomenon of...").

Submitting Assignments

How to Submit:

All assignments, unless otherwise announced, MUST be submitted to the designated area of Canvas modules section. YD is submitted through the YD platform. Please do not submit an assignment via email.

Deadlines:

Please check the announcements for a course schedule with numeric due dates. Assignment due dates follow Arizona Standard time. Click the following link to access the <u>Time in AZ</u> to account for the difference in time zones. AZ does not observe daylight savings time.

Late or Missed Assignments

Communication:

If possible, notify the instructor **BEFORE** an assignment is due if an urgent situation arises and you are unable to submit the assignment on time. Follow the appropriate University policies to request an <u>accommodation for religious practices</u> or to accommodate a missed assignment <u>due to University-sanctioned activities</u>.

Life Happens Policy:

It is always difficult for an instructor to balance the need for understanding that "life happens," and being fair to the majority of students who also have busy schedules and unexpected crises,

yet still find a way to get their work in on time. Almost always, this is a matter of planning ahead. Most circumstances that can delay submission of assignments will not last for days at a time and if you did not wait until the last minute, you would have been able to submit. PLEASE BEAR THIS IN MIND WHEN REQUESTING AN EXTENSION. If you are asking for something outside the bounds of what is described here, you are essentially asking me to bend the rules for you.

While planning ahead is clearly a must if it's important to you not to lose any points, I provide the following late policy in the hopes of achieving fairness for everyone, and a less stressful atmosphere:

If you miss a quiz or YD assignment you can request a make up from your CA. Please do so right away to give time to complete it. This needs to be complete within a week. NOTE that if the last day of class is earlier than usual (see course schedule in announcements from week one) any assignments being made up from week six may be due sooner as all assignments must be submitted by the last day of class. Make up assignments are intended as a <u>one time option</u>, please don't rely on this repeatedly. If you have a significant crisis or life event (accident, injury, serious illness, etc.) that causes you to miss multiple assignments please discuss with me right away.

SAILS:

If you are a SAILS student with flexible deadlines, please note that this course already has flexible deadlines built in. If you require more than this, please let me know.

Missing Scores:

In the event that a score is missing from the Canvas grade center and a submission is not recorded, the instructor must be notified **no later than 72 hours** after the deadline of the assignment or test. Do not wait until the end of the session to discuss missing scores. A screenshot displaying the time and date of the submission or other documentation bearing a valid Canvas timestamp must be provided to substantiate any claims of having submitted work that is not appearing in the grade book.

Respect and Professionalism

Respect (for classmates, the instructor, and oneself) is of great importance in this class. In order for critical thinking and open communication to occur in the academic environment, students must feel safe to express themselves. Part of the college experience is being exposed to new ideas--from the readings, media selections, classmates, and the instructor. Students will have the opportunity to share their own ideas, beliefs, and experiences as they relate to course material. Often individual perspectives will differ among members of the class. It is very important to learn to disagree respectfully with one's peers and to thoughtfully and critically formulate one's viewpoint. The material shared in this class always must reflect an academic forum. Disrespectful or disruptive behavior or language intended to insult, demean, or stigmatize individuals or groups will not be tolerated and may lead to sanctions such as removal from the class or expulsion from the university.

Controversial Course Material

Topics of a sensitive, mature, or controversial nature may be discussed in class or included in the readings and/or resource materials. Films and readings considered graphic by some audiences may be utilized in this course. Students are responsible for the course material and assignments. Students concerned by this must speak with the instructor at the start of the semester. If a student finds any of the content of this class offensive, he or she should bring their concerns to the instructor immediately.

Drop and Add Dates/Withdrawals

The following are some guidelines to consider when engaging in online discussion and discourse:

- **Be kind and polite.** Be mindful of your tone and do not make fun of another person for any reason.
- **Be respectful.** Being part of an academic community means being exposed to diverse perspectives and viewpoints. Be respectful in all situations and in your critiques. If you wouldn't say it face to face, don't say it online.
- **Be wary of sarcasm.** In person, sarcastic comments can be funny and break up a tense situation. Online, it's hard to tell the difference between when someone is being sarcastic and when someone is genuinely being rude.
- **Avoid stereotyping**. Just because someone holds view X, and some people you know of who hold view X also hold view Y, doesn't mean that holding view X means holding view Y.
- Use proper grammar and spelling. Typos and basic spelling mistakes will happen, but if it's detracting from you message, it can be difficult to figure out what you mean. Also, you should avoid using all caps as this can imply shouting in the online environment.

Harassment Prohibited

ASU policy prohibits harassment on the basis of race, sex, gender identity, age, religion, national origin, disability, sexual orientation, Vietnam era veteran status, and other protected veteran status. Violations of this policy may result in disciplinary action, including termination of employees or expulsion of students. Al Use:

No Generative AI Use Permitted. In this course, all assignments must be completed by the student. Artificial Intelligence (AI), including ChatGPT and other related tools used for creating of text, images, computer code, audio, or other media, are not permitted for use in any work in this class. Use of these generative AI tools will be considered a violation of the <u>ASU Academic Integrity Policy</u>, and students may be sanctioned for confirmed, non-allowable use in this course.
