Course Description: Raster and Vector Illustration in Publishing.

Overview:

This course presents an overview of digital illustration applications: Adobe Photoshop and Adobe Illustrator. The course is arranged in a series of lectures and reading assignments that develop knowledge and technical projects, creative projects, and quizzes to reinforce the materials.

The emphasis of this course will be on developing hands-on experience by completing various technical and creative projects. Students will learn about the fundamentals of Adobe Photoshop for raster graphic creation and editing as well as Adobe Illustrator for vector graphics.

Late or Missed Assignments

<u>Late quizzes are not accepted</u>. Students can turn in other late projects but there is a 10% deduction per day late. This penalty is automatically applied by the Canvas grade book.
