Catalog Description

Follows the thread of energy through every aspect of our lives. Discusses the technical, social, legal, and policy contexts of all energy resources, including present and unconventional fossil fuels, nuclear power, and renewable resources. Addresses energy use throughout history, the influence of energy on quality of life, the role it plays in political strategies and environmental quality, how it shapes our neighborhoods and cities, its contribution to our personal comfort and national security, and how its importance is reflected in the worlds of business and the humanities. Its dual role is as a stand-alone introduction to energy, and as a first step to more advanced studies of energy in the natural, technical, and social sciences.

Course Outcomes

By the end of this course, you will be able to...

- CO 1: Discuss the general history of energy, fossil fuels, and renewable energy.
- CO 2: Identify areas suffering with energy poverty.
- CO 3: Create a vision for a sustainable energy future.
- CO 4: Calculate your own energy footprint.
- CO 5: Familiarize with and evaluate the credibility of diverse sources related to sustainability issues.
- CO 6: Demonstrate effective interpersonal communication (written and oral) and presentation skills.

Course Workload Expectations

This online class is 135 credit hours over 7.5 weeks. You should plan to spend approximately 18 hours per week on reviewing class materials and completing activities and assessments.

Assessment Descriptions

Quizzes: (24%)

Every module contains a five-question quiz to ensure that you read, reviewed, and watched the module's material. The quizzes will only include multiple choice and true/false questions. These quizzes are not meant to be challenging or trick you; they are simply a way to ensure that you reviewed the module's material.

Yellowdig Discussion: (28%)

Every module, you will participate in a discussion using Yellowdig. The prompts or questions will reflect the module's material and require you to directly apply what you have learned.

Major Assignments: (48%)

Every module, you will have to complete a Major Assignment. The Major Assignments ask you to apply the module's knowledge, or even perhaps review one additional piece of material, to deepen your understanding of the content. Each one will be a unique assignment.

Extra Credit (5%)

This course uses "Assignment Weights" to calculate your final grade. The table above displays what % each assignment type is worth. Note that the Extra Credit is worth 5%, for a course total of 105%. If you do everything perfectly in the course *except for the extra credit*, your highest possible score is 100%.

Please Note: If you choose not to do the extra credit, your instructor will enter a grade of 0. At the time that the extra credit is offered, the course is not yet complete - so you

have not had the opportunity to earn the total 105%. Your final score, at that moment, may appear to drop. Once the course is complete and all grades are entered out of the possible 105%, your grade will be accurately calculated.
