# **Course Description:**

CSE691 has been created to introduce you to concepts in SCAI research and to help prepare you for beginning your PhD.

# **Course Objectives:**

The course is a 15 weeklong, one-credit course designed to teach students about SCAI research including identifying research topics, literature reviews, and proposal writing. The class will culminate in each student writing a research syllabus.
