- 4. Develop skills to discuss, analyze, and evaluate films as cultural artifacts through informal and formal presentations.

# Course Details

## **Assignments**

Assignments are based on course materials, primarily the films we will watch and discuss each week. Required films are posted above.

#### **SUMMARY AND RESPONSE** | 100 points possible

A 600-800 word essay summarizing and responding to the Module 1 reading "Movies and Culture" from Understanding Media and Culture. Due July 7.

#### YELLOWDIG DISCUSSIONS | 225 points possible.

Each week students create original posts and respond to classmates on the Yellowdig discussion platform. Due each week. Full details are covered in the Course Introduction Activity. All detail can also be found in Course Documents under the Technology tab.

#### FILM REVIEW | 150 points possible

Create a 700-800 word film review that discusses how one course film reflects attitudes and trends about women & culture. Reviews will be published to the class and can be presented in a variety of media formats, including podcast, traditional essay, illustrated text, narrated presentation, video, etc. Due July 19.

#### FILM ANALYSIS | 225 points possible

A 1000-1200 word essay that analyzes how one of the films in the course reflects, interprets, politicizes, and/or comments on societal attitudes and ideologies about women and their intersecting identities, such as race, class, gender, ethnicity, religion, ability, age, political ideologies, etc. Independent, academic research required. Due August 7.

**Extra Credit:** An optional Extra Credit Project is available and can be found under Course Documents. Due August 2.
