This is a hybrid course, which is a combination of traditional classroom and online instruction. It involves independent work by students, a significant portion of which will be performed online. Modern language study involves four skills: listening, speaking, reading, and writing. The primary goal of ITA 202 is to develop sufficient proficiency in these four skills to reach the ACTFL level of Intermediate Mid (please see the ACTFL Guidelines posted on Canvas).

- 4. Express opinions, make comparisons and discuss hypothetical situation in Italian in both written and oral language.

Why Italian?

You have chosen to study the fourth most studied foreign language in US universities, congratulations! Italian is a fascinating and beautiful language, and not very difficult to learn. It is a must-know language for lovers of art, music, literature, fashion, design, architecture and, yes, food! And Italy is the number one tourist destination in the world, so hopefully you will go

there to study or explore the *Beautiful Country* and dazzle Italians with your newly-acquired language skills!

Course description

This course will be structured in two sections. In the first section, the "MODULI" or units are based on certain Italian literary genres: diaries, letters, blogs and fairy tales. In the second section, the units are based on certain values in Italian culture: the importance of the family and Italian cleverness. Each unit will include multimedia texts and related activities that are available through your Canvas shell for this course or directly on the following website: http://www.asu.edu/clas/silc/ita/ola/ It is the students' responsibility to bring the material in class, printed out or downloaded from the website on their personal laptop.

Interpersonal communication: Intermediate Mid (IM) Speaker can exchange information, preferences, feelings or opinions in conversations on familiar topics and some researched topics, creating sentences and series of sentences and asking a variety of follow-up questions; interact with others to meet needs in a variety of familiar situations, creating sentences and series of sentences and asking a variety of follow-up questions.

Presentational speaking: IM Speaker can tell a story about his or her life, activities, events and other social experiences, state viewpoint about familiar topics and give some reasons to support it, using sentences and series of connected sentences.

Interpretive listening: IM - IH Speaker can identify the topic and related information in straightforward conversations; can sometimes follow the main message in various time frames in conversations and discussions.

Interpretive reading: IM - IH Speaker can usually follow the main message in various time frames in straightforward and sometimes descriptive, paragraph-length informational or fictional texts.

Presentational Writing: IM - IH Speaker can state his or her viewpoint on familiar or researched topics and provide reasons to support it, give detailed presentations on a variety of familiar topics and some concrete researched topics, offer viewpoints and give reasons to support them and tell a story about his or her life, activities, events and other social experiences using a few short paragraphs, often across various time frames.

Intercultural communication: Intermediate (I) In his or her own and other cultures, speaker can compare products and practices related to everyday life and personal interests or studies, especially as it relates to various texts, values and traditions of Italian culture.
