COURSE OBJECTIVES - The objectives of this course are to introduce students to a wide array of issues and subjects involving Indian Law. In addition, the course will contribute to students developing the legal skills to research, analyze, and communicate about legal issues.

GRADING

Grades are assigned pursuant to Section VII of the JD Statement of Student Policies. Grades will be determined on the following basis: a final exam and students participation, or lack thereof, in class discussions.

ATTENDANCE POLICY - As required per the ABA and ASU policies.

Section IV.B. of the JD Statement of Student Policies. Attendance is an essential element of successful academic performance. Students are expected to attend all classes. Faculty members may grant excused status for a student's absence for all or part of a class period at their discretion. Permissible reasons may include illness, a serious medical condition, family emergency, other extraordinary а or circumstances. Faculty members may not treat a student who misses class but watches a recording of that class as having attended class, although it may be an excused absence.

A. Excessive Absences

A faculty member in any law school course, seminar, or other offering may withdraw a student for excessive absence.

"Excessive absence" is defined as more than two unexcused absences for a class that meets once a week and more than four unexcused absences for a class that meets twice a week. For courses the administration designates as a "special attendance course" and which are so noted in the course description and syllabus, a faculty member may define excessive absence differently.

Withdrawal for excessive absences in any course, seminar, or offering for credit shall presumptively be recorded as a failing grade (E). Students who believe they have good cause for failing to attend may petition a

committee designated by the dean, which may in its discretion convert the grade to a W.

B. Total Absences

If a student's total absences (including both excused and unexcused absences) reach the limits set forth below, the faculty member and the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs must approve any additional requests for an absence, excused or otherwise. Absent extraordinary circumstances, such requests must be made before the class is missed. If additional absences are not approved, the student will be withdrawn from the course.

For a class that meets twice a week, the limit on total absences is six.

The observance of religious holidays or cultural celebrations and practices (activities observed by a religious or cultural group of which a student is a member) are an important expression of identity and diversity. As your instructor, I am committed to providing equivalent educational opportunities to students of all belief systems. At the beginning of the semester, you should review the course requirements to identify foreseeable conflicts with assignments, exams, or other required attendance. Per ASU Policy ACD § 304-4, please contact me within the first two weeks of the first class meeting to allow time for us to discuss and make fair and reasonable adjustments to the schedule and/or tasks.

Students should notify the instructor at the beginning of the semester or as soon as they become aware about the need to be absent from class due to university-sanctioned events/activities pursuant to ASU's Academic Affairs Manual § 304-02.

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY AND STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT

EXPECTED WORK PER CREDIT HOUR

Students should expect to work approximately two hours out of class for every hour spent in class.

CLASSROOM BEHAVIOR

Respect for the thoughts, ideas, and speech of classmates and faculty is the foundation of the educational process. Threatening behavior in the classroom will be dealt with in accordance with SSM § 104-02, which requires that "all incidents and allegations of violent or threatening conduct by an ASU student (whether on- or off-campus) must be reported to the ASU Police Department and the Office of the Dean of Students."

The use of electronic devices during class is prohibited with the exception of laptops used for class purposes. Recording the class in any manner without the permission of the instructor is prohibited.

POLICY ON THREATENING BEHAVIOR
